Second grade students have been learning about plants and insects in science since the beginning of the school year. We have observed mealworms, milkweed bugs, brassica plants, silkworms, and caterpillars! The students have enjoyed watching the plants and insects grow and change as they go through their lifecycles. Our young scientists have documented the changes using their science journals.

Mary Bulger, the Iowa County Naturalist, presented a program called Monarch Migration to enhance our learning about insects. Students traveled through the monarch's lifecycle in a game where they encountered numerous obstacles that determined whether the monarchs would survive. Some were eaten by spiders, others died in a prairie fire, and the weather was too cold or too hot for some of the eggs. A few hatched and were able to make it to the next stage in the lifecycle. There were still more dangers ahead for the young caterpillars! The second graders were shocked to find out that only 2% of monarchs survive long enough to migrate! They also discovered that they could help the monarch population by planting milkweed.

We were also fortunate to use 3D google expedition goggles to watch various insects and animals act as pollinators in their natural habitats! Students were amazed as they explored in this 3D realm.

What an exciting time to be in 2nd grade!

Our sixth graders were very excited to start using their Chromebooks the end of September. This year we decided that it would work out best to have the students become familiar with using the Chromebooks at school before allowing them to take them home. We are planning to send them home at Parent/Teacher Conferences on November 1st and 2nd. Thank you for all returning the paperwork for the Iowa Valley One to One Devices. The students have been using their Chromebooks for spelling, vocabulary, reading, social studies, writing, iReady math program, keyboarding, library, and a variety of learning games. We have gone over the responsibility of having a Chromebook and hope that the parents have taken time to discuss the device policy as well. We are very fortunate that our school provides this tool to enrich our students learning at Iowa Valley Schools!

2017-2018 Professional Learning Targets

To provide an engaged educational environment that promotes student investment and continued learning.

Vocabulary:

Common Core Standards - statements that lay out a set of expectations regarding what learners must know and be able to do in different content areas (including 21st Century Skills) and across grade levels and ranges.

Feedback - information about learning that helps the owner take the next steps in their learning process.

- Teacher to student (evaluative)
- Teacher to student (descriptive)
- Student to student
- Student to teacher

Individual Professional Development Plan - each teacher will develop individual goals based on their own professional development needs; and centered around the Iowa teaching standards and student achievement goals that the school district has implemented. Teachers then reflect on their progress throughout the year.

Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) - a preventionbased framework of teams that solve problems based on data to improve student outcomes and instructional practices at the classroom, school, district, region, and state levels.

Opportunities are Always Available for Teacher Learning

Science K-8 (GWAEA)

Kindergarten through eighth grade science teachers have been training at Grant Wood Area Education Agency. With science kits that are aligned to Iowa Core and Next Generation Science Standards, Iowa Valley teachers have twoday trainings where they have hands on experiences with various science unit investigations. Students love these kits when they can become scientists themselves.

NWEA Assessments

Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) assessments continue to be given to all 7th through 11th graders. In the Fall and Spring, Iowa Valley Jr-Sr High School give four separate tests in Reading, Mathematics, Language, and Science. These assessment screeners are individualized, based on each student's answers, and they are encouraged to show growth from one screening to the next. Students and teachers really like these assessments because they are now web-based and they get immediate feedback on their scores. NWEA has also added new reports and teachers will be helping students set their own goals based on individual growth in all areas.

FastBridge Literacy Assessments

Teachers at the elementary are learning a new literacy screener, as the state has moved from the old Iowa TIER system to the FastBridge database. These formative assessments are given to all students (K-6) three times a year. Teachers are able to screen, identify and monitor student reading progress; and with new reports, these assessments can lead to faster interventions to help struggling students make greater growth in the areas of fluency and comprehension.

Next month look for more teacher learning focusing on At Risk, Science & Teacher Leadership.
