Senate File 2364- High-Quality Emergency Operations Plans for Schools

Governor Kim Reynolds signed SF2364 on April 11, 2018 last spring as a means of ensuring that schools develop high-quality emergency operations plans for all buildings, where students are taught, no later than June 30, 2019. Most schools already have a plan in place but, with this new legislation, it will require changes and a deeper look at all man-made and natural disasters. The high-quality plan will need to:

- Assess our current plan in terms of emergency planning, procedures, incidents, drills, building access, key controls, staff training, and facility design
- Address all threats and hazards including lockdown, evacuation, reunification, and shelter-in-place
- Include a clear understanding of safety operations

- Reach out to community partnerships to help develop the plan which will include law enforcement, emergency managers, staff members, parents, and medical/mental health personnel
- Assign roles and responsibilities
- Implement a process for continuous review at least annually
- Review the incident command structure
- Provide a means of obtaining reports of possible threats to the safety of students or school personnel on school grounds or at school activities
- Remain confidential and not be a public record subject to disclosure under Chapter 22
- Include at least one emergency operations drill which may include, but is not limited to, table top exercises, walk-through trainings, partial drills, or full drills

Our latest real-life safety scenario was on Tuesday, October 9, when numerous tornado warnings invaded our area. Timing of these warnings was not ideal as it was at the end of our regular school day. However, we

have no control over the weather and it can change in a matter of minutes in Iowa. Keeping students and staff protected and safe is our top priority. For this reason, students will not be released during a tornado warning. Parents who are at the school should come into the building for best protection. After the warning, you may take your child(ren) home with you. There was some confusion on this and we will get this protocol “cleaned up” when we review our emergency operations plans for our school district.

Let's continue to support one another in providing a safe and secure learning environment for all of our students at Iowa Valley Community School District. Working on this high-quality safety plan will empower everyone to act knowingly and quickly before, during, and after an incident should it ever occur. Knowledge is power.

Social Studies standards: Year 2 of implementation

As standardized tests continue to focus on reading/language, math, and science scores, social studies is making gains in promoting the importance of teaching students how to make informed decisions as members of a democratic society. The new social studies standards not only cover history, geography and government (like most adults remember their own school experiences), but it also incorporates global studies, economics, financial literacy and Iowa history at all grade levels. It also connects literacy standards.

Social studies teachers at Iowa Valley are attending workshops and beginning the implementation of the new standards in their classrooms. Students will be learning social studies in a whole different way. Besides content that may change from grade to grade, students will learn inquiry standards that they can apply to any subject. These anchor standards include:

- constructing compelling questions
- constructing supporting questions
- gathering and evaluating sources
- developing claims and using evidence
- communicating and critiquing conclusions
- taking informed action

The differences you might see in social studies classrooms are lessons outside of textbooks, incorporating literacy and technology into the learning, using primary and secondary sources and asking questions to understand the content. Students won't be memorizing dates and facts, but making connections to how they relate to other dates and facts.

Students will be able to answer their own questions or create new questions based on resource evidence. They will develop learning strategies that will help them adapt to today's ever-changing social circumstances.

Be watching for these changes in social studies classrooms across the district. This is year two of a four year implementation plan.

Model Teacher of the Month


Mrs. Amy Jacobson is our highlighted model teacher for the month of November.
